
JEREMIAH 1: 5; 29: 11-14


"Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I set you apart;..."

THE CALLING OF ST MATTHEW

Vocation comes from the latin word for "calling". Jesus called his disciples to follow him. Matthew was one of those disicples called by Jesus. Matthew was a tax collector and not well liked at all. Tax collectors were often greedy and would cheat people by charging them too much money. Matthew was the same, he wanted to make money and become rich. Then one day he met Jesus, who asked him to become one of his followers. Everyone was suprised that Jesus had even spoken to Matthew. They could not understand why Jesus was befriending him; they were even more surprised when Matthew agreed. They thought that Jesus would just choose good honest people to be his disciples. The story of Matthew's vocation shows us how God calls us all, no matter who we are or what we have done, to follow him.
