Holocaust Memorial Day takes place on the 27th January each year and is a time to remember the millions of people murdered during the Holocaust, under Nazi persecution and in the genocides which followed in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur. These genocides are examples of when people do not try to understand others and instead of seeing what they have in common see only differences and see them as a threat. Holocaust Memorial Day teaches us how important it is to understand others, their culture,

their language and their way of life.
