
PEACE

LUKE 6: 27-38

Sunday 15th January was Peace Sunday and each year the Pope chooses a theme, a theme that encourages us to come together to work for peace.

This year's theme is "No one can be saved alone. Embarking together on paths of peace."

This is what Archbishop Malcolm McMahon (the Archbishop of Liverpool) said about

Pope Francis' Peace Sunday address.

"2022 has been a year of war and rumours of war. Lives lost, people displaced, fear and suspicion overwhelming many communities around the world. These wars are also contributing to the destruction of our environment. Sometimes it feels as though we have moved backwards in our efforts to bring peace and justice to our world. However, the constant, faithful voice of Pope Francis urges us to keep going. Whether he is speaking about Ukraine and Russia, Yemen or the Middle East, his message is always the same: No to war and no to the trade in weapons that fuel war. His All Saints Angelus message offers these questions: 'Brothers and sisters, let us look within and ask ourselves: are we peacemakers? In the places where we live, study and work, do we bring tension, words that hurt, chatter that poisons, controversy that divides? Or do we open up the way to peace?"
