#### **Reconciliation Week**

This week, as part of Lent, pupils have been given the opportunity to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation. In preparation for this, in their assemblies pupils have listened to Jesus' Parable of the Lost Sheep, which emphasises that sometimes we can get separated from God. When sheep get separated from their shepherd, they can feel alone and end up in trouble.

The same is true in our relationship with Jesus. When we wander from him or ignore his voice, we feel alone and sometimes find ourselves in situations that are not the best for us. We can take comfort in knowing however that we are loved so deeply that God will do whatever it takes to find us when we're lost and then care for us like a shepherd lovingly cares for his sheep. Pupils then took part in an examination of conscience which invited them to look prayerfully into their hearts and to ask how they have distanced themselves from God and other people through their thoughts, words and actions. This is a great way to prepare us for confessions or the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Confession is how we make our way back to God, and when we are found and welcomed back by the father.

In the afternoons, Priests from our family of Parishes came into school to hear pupils' confessions and administer the Sacrament of Reconciliation. It proved a great opportunity for pupils to have the weight lifted off their shoulders and feel free from sin. It is a chance to reset our lives and start over, a change to try again at living a saintly life we are all called to.

Flame 2025 saw more than 10,000 young people from every part of England and Wales, including a group of Year 8's, 9's and 10's from All Hallows who travelled with other groups from Liverpool Archdiocese to London on Saturday. We saw groups from Gibraltar and the Ukrainian national Chaplaincy, join chaplains, teachers, priests, bishops, and youth leaders, in selling out the OVO Arena Wembley in a huge explosion of faith and hope. The theme of the day was 'Unstoppable: Fan the flame of hope!' Inspirational speakers included adventurer and television presenter Bear Grylls, who spoke about his book The Greatest Story Ever Told based on the Gospel – every attendee received a copy!

In conversation with Catholic speaker David Wells, Mr Grylls shed light on his Christian faith:

"Faith is in your heart, faith is in relationships, faith is a constant connection to the Almighty. I have many struggles, many doubts, I really don't have it all together, but I know that I am loved and held, and the light shines.

"Faith is part of the adventure, faith is the adventure. It's a journey... It's a backbone, a streak of steel, the presence of Jesus besides us in the highs and the lows. It's fire and life and water, all in one. It's a journey."

To a packed out and loud crowd, he added:

"I hope you have an amazing rest of Flame. You guys are unstoppable!" Flame's theme of "Unstoppable: Fan the flame of hope" echoed what Pope Francis calls us to be in this year of Jubilee: "Pilgrims of Hope."

Rt Rev David Oakley, Bishop of Northampton, read a message from Cardinal Parolin on behalf of Pope Francis, who encouraged the young people saying: "Fan a flame of hope that is truly 'unstoppable' for Christ itself is its living source."

Bryan Enriquez, a founding team member of the Hallow prayer app, spoke as well as Isaac Harvey MBE, an inspiring disability advocate. Isaac Harvey said: "It's about having faith, having hope, and at the end of the day having fun. Going with the flow, having fun, and taking

Fr Dominic Howarth, a priest of Brentwood Diocese read a message from the Apostolic Nuncio in Great Britain, H. E. Archbishop Miguel Mary Buendiá, who encouraged the young people with these words:

"Let your faith shine brightly in the world, and know that you are not alone on this journey."

The message from St Vincent de Paul Society was: "You are loved, you are lovable, and you are loved by God."

CAFOD partner, Brian Maeba, a young farmer from Kenya, spoke about the global debt crisis, where some of the world's poorest countries make huge repayments on high-interest loans to wealthy banks, institutions and governments, leaving them unable to fund essential services.

Brian encouraged the audience to support CAFOD's debt cancellation campaign by shouting out "cancel debt and choose hope".

The music served to support these values with One Hope Project bringing their Christian worship music to the stage. Guvna B rapped about Jesus being our light and guide, whilst singer Adenike, an ambassador for CAFOD, got the crowd singing along to faith and hope based music. The best performance of the day came from the World Youth Dance crew who got the whole arena quite literally bouncing!

All the young people had Pilgrim Passports which they had to fill in during the day, searching around the concourses for a stamp from the different Catholic Charities and Religious Orders.

Flame 2025 concluded with a moving moment of Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, led by Cardinal Vincent Nichols, capping a day of spiritual renewal, encouraging young people to return to their parishes and schools as ambassadors of hope.









#### **CAFOD ASSEMBLIES**

Last week, Maureen Nickson – a volunteer for CAFOD – came in to school to talk to each year group about CAFOD's fundraising focus this Lent and how the All Hallows community can help. She told us about Khera's community in Kenya, who lost all their livestock due to drought brought on by climate change. CAFOD's focus is to buy communities like this sustainable chickens, which require less water, in order to sell their eggs and make an income again. Each indigenous chicken costs £4.20 and is more disease resistant, requires less water and lays more eggs.

So, the focus of our Lent campaign in this Jubilee Year of Hope is chickens for communities like Khera's in Kenya!

We have our CAFOD fast day and CAFOD own clothes day which will raise money for this on Friday 28th March and the sponsored Big Lent Walk from St Oswald's Parish Church to St Teresa's Parish Church and back is on Saturday 29th March. Let's see how much money we can raise and how many chickens it will buy!







#### Uniform Pop-Up Shop



This year, students at All Hallows, alongside Faith in Action, have decided to launch the Uniform Pop-Up Shop. This initiative will provide an opportunity for old uniforms to find a new home as part of our recycling efforts. This project contributes towards the Live Simply Award here at school, and we hope that through this, we can gain a greater understanding of our impact on the environment.





## Celebrating STEM Month: Inspiring the Next Generation of Innovators

March has been an exciting month for STEM at our school, with students engaging in hands-on experiences that bring science, technology, engineering, and mathematics to life. Through a range of activities and workshops, pupils have expanded their skills, explored potential careers, and worked collaboratively to solve real-world challenges.

#### Big Bang In School: game. Set. Match

Year 7 and 8 have been able to take part in the Big Bang in School day where they had the opportunity to research and design a solution to a problem that could affect an athlete or that would support a sport. Pupils were shown examples of Hawkeye in Tennis and a Boxing app that supported boxers being able to see their progress on a daily basis, strike patterns, effort levels etc and were then tasked with creating an innovative design solution of their own for a sport of their choice. Some pupils considered prosthetic limbs for people swimming the Channel, others created apps to support football training and some even designed new clothing to keep muscles warm and stretched for cold climates. All work is being shortlisted and a number of entries will be submitted to the All About STEM competition later next month. Well done for your creative and imaginative designs.



#### 312 Printing Workshop - 1th March

Year 8 students took part in a thrilling 3D printing workshop, delivered by Create Education/BAE Systems, where they developed their OnShape skills to design a nose cone for a rocket. This session not only honed their digital design abilities but also provided an opportunity to see 3D printing in action. To put their creations to the test, pupils launched their rockets outside using vitamin C tablets and water, applying principles of aerodynamics and propulsion. This hands-on experience not only reinforced key STEM concepts but also highlighted real-world applications, inspiring students to consider future careers in engineering, design, and technology.

### Young Chef Regional Competition

Last half term we were very pleased to be able to submit nine written entries into the Young Chef Competition through Blackburn College. Pupils had to work together to devise a dish using chicken, seasonal and local vegetables and explain how they were considering sustainability and the environment through their choices.

We are delighted to have found out that 2 of our pairs have been selected to take part in the Regional round where they will work together in their pairs, to make and present their dishes. After the heats are all completed, six winning pairs will go through to cook against each other in the final.


