Faith in Action Awards

This week, pupils from Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 have been preparing their final projects for their Faith in Action awards. Pupils are either aiming for their Bronze, Silver or Gold awards. Their final project evidences their spiritual journey during the award and how they have engaged with the Catholic life of the school and their parish, through servant leadership and love of neighbour.

For the Gold award, which several Year 9 and 10 pupils are working towards, they have to show an ongoing commitment to active service, outreach and missionary work on behalf of the Church community. This could involve taking a leadership role or organising a charity fundraiser. One of our pupils, Phoebe, has set up a school uniform bank for families to access and swap unused school uniforms.

The Silver award, which several Year 8 and 9 pupils are working towards, recognises and encourages a maturity of faith which is expressed in terms of leadership and initiative. Pupils show evidence of playing an active role in the Catholic life of the community, but also taking the lead. One of our pupils, Skyla, is taking a lead in encouraging the school community to 'Live Simply' by designing classroom signs to care for the environment.

The Bronze award, which several of our Y7 pupils are working towards, recognises those who regularly show service to others, by playing a role in school and parish events, such as taking part in Mass, and contributing to the SVP group and CAFOD club.

The award helps participants understand how faith binds people together so that they all belong to the Church community. It encourages young people to think about how they use their gifts and talents in response to their God-given vocation. It also rewards a maturity of faith which leads to innovation and leadership within the Catholic community.

Once final projects have been completed, pupils will receive their Faith in Action badges and certificates at the end of June at an Archdiocesan ceremony at Lowe House, St Helens.



<u>Work Experience Week:</u> 180 Pupils Gain Hands-On Experience Across a Wide Range of Industries

Before half term, 180 pupils took part in a week-long work experience program, immersing themselves in a broad spectrum of career fields. Placements included education, engineering, retail, construction, hospitality, health, law, manufacturing, the film industry, leisure, beauty, police headquarters, and architecture, giving students a well-rounded taste of the professional world.

Whether supporting teachers in classrooms or assisting healthcare professionals, pupils explored rewarding roles in education and health. Engineering and manufacturing placements challenged students with technical tasks and innovation, while construction and architecture opportunities highlighted the creativity involved in designing and building spaces.

In retail, hospitality, leisure, and beauty sectors, pupils developed strong customer service, communication, and teamwork skills, working in dynamic, fast-paced environments. Those in the film industry gained valuable insight into production processes, creative teamwork, and media technology. Law placements introduced pupils to the legal system through research and observation, while placements at police headquarters provided a close-up look at community safety and law enforcement operations.

The diverse range of placements allowed pupils to discover new passions and develop important skills such as time management, problem-solving, and professionalism. Their enthusiasm and dedication impressed employers across all sectors. We thank all the local businesses and organizations who hosted our pupils and contributed to making this week a valuable and inspiring experience. This work experience program has been an important step in helping students explore potential career paths and build confidence for their futures.















CHELTENHAM LADIES' COLLEGE

On Friday 16th May, a group of 13 Year 10 girls visited Cheltenham Ladies' College for a day of activities focused on helping them with their post-16 education. The girls were joined by a group from Holy Cross Catholic High School, Chorley as a collaboration between the schools. The aim was to help the girls gain a wider perspective on their choices after GCSE and to help them improve skills that they will need for Sixth Form and beyond. The girls attended sessions focused on university applications and debating skills, as well as touring the college and boarding houses. We also were thrilled to see two of our Alumni who are currently attending Cheltenham Ladies' College: Erin N and Lola H. It was great to see that they were both doing well and that they had some helpful words of wisdom for any of the girls hoping to follow in their footsteps. The girls all thoroughly enjoyed the trip, and we hope that some will be inspired to follow in Erin and Lola's footsteps.

Young Chef Final - Blackburn College

We were over the moon to be able to take 2 pairs of finalists to the Young Chef Final at Blackburn College. This was following 2 previous rounds and being whittled down from 50 different school applications. Ruby and Will as well as Chloe and Addison (all Year 9) competed in their pairs, against 5 other finalists, to create 2 plates of their main and 2 plates of their dessert in intense competition surroundings. Ruby and Will created a spectacular Sunday roast inspired bacon wrapped, cheese stuffed, chicken burger with honey carrot ribbons on a homemade brioche style bun, served with horseradish mashed potato, buttered asparagus, homemade yorkshire puddings and a parmesan crisp. Their dessert featured caramelised bananas over crepes with a caramel sauce and tanghulu - a sugar glazed strawberry. Chloe and Addison created the most delicious Katsu Chicken curry, making the sauce from scratch, a beautiful coconut and lime rice and homemade vegetable gyozas with pickled side salad. Their dessert was a decadent Rhubarb and strawberry compote, layered with matcha chantilly cream, honey baked granola and chocolate fudge crinkle biscuits. All the dishes showed exceptional skills and they had worked incredibly hard practising their dishes on the run up to the final.

Incredibly, both pairs achieved top 3 finishes, which is absolutely outstanding. In 2nd place, Chloe and Addison were the proud winners of £150 voucher each to spend at Nigel Howarth's restaurant the Three Fishes. In 3rd place, Ruby and Will won £50 each towards a kitchen appliance of their choice. We are so unbelievably proud and happy for all of these pupils achieving such amazing success against very strong opposition.

A huge thank you to Dave Lyons and his team for their hard work at Blackburn College, not only organising the event but showcasing the talent of the young chefs training there as well as achieving funding to help the competition take place. We really appreciate their hard work and continued promotion of the hospitality and catering industry and all associated career paths.

<u>Year 7 Trip to France – May 2025</u> <u>Parlez-vous français? Year 7 certainly do!</u>

Friday 16th May

At 10:45 pm, forty-eight Year 7 students and six of their teachers set out on the long journey to Dover. There was a great deal of excitement under clear, starry skies. We were on our way!

Saturday 17th May

We arrived at Dover around 6:30 am. Some had slept more than others! We seemed to be the only coach there, and the port did not appear to be open. However, after a very brief passport check, we headed to our lane in readiness for the 8:15 am ferry, over an hour ahead of schedule. The ferry was quiet, and the crossing was smooth. An hour and a half later, we arrived in France. Our first stop was at Wimereux War Memorial, where the First World War poet John McCrae is laid to rest. We listened to his famous poem "In Flanders Fields" and said a prayer, thinking of all those who have passed away. Our students were very respectful during our visit. After a brief stop at the beach at Ambleteuse, we headed to the bakery at Escœuilles. This proved to be an enjoyable visit, as our students watched how bread is made, folded the dough themselves, and later ate a pain au chocolat—all the while listening as the baker explained everything in French. The students gained a lot from this experience and really used their loaf to answer questions. Afterwards, we headed to our accommodation (the Hôtel du Moulin aux Draps in Desvres). Following our evening meal and a treasure hunt, it was an early night for everyone.

Sunday 18th May

After a very good French breakfast, it was time to head to the market at Condette. Here, our students really excelled. The task was to buy provisions to make a picnic lunch, which we later ate in Boulogne. Very little English was heard as our students bought ham, cheese, olives, fruit, whole chickens, and even squid! The local stallholders seemed very impressed, as did the seagulls, as we ate our lunch outside the Sea Life Centre in Boulogne. Nausicaa is the largest sea life centre in France, and it proved to be an enjoyable visit for our students as they saw thousands of fish, sharks, and other sea creatures. After a brief stop in the old part of Boulogne, we returned to the hotel for our evening meal (which included the opportunity to eat snails), a quiz afterwards, and a woodland walk to round off the day. It had been a fantastic day.

<u>Monday 19th May</u>

We said "au revoir" to our hotel after another good breakfast and headed to the Escargotière at Saint-Martin-Choquel. Visiting a snail farm might not be on everyone's bucket list, but this proved to be another interesting stop as our host explained all manner of snail-related facts. Our students were great again, and a good number sampled the snails on offer—those in garlic sauce were delicious! A little while later, we headed to Calais for our ferry. A long journey lay ahead, but our students remained in good spirits. We arrived back at school at 10:50 pm.

<u>Summary</u>

Our students really threw themselves into this trip. They engaged in all the activities and spoke a great deal of French, which various members of the public commented on. I would like to thank them for making the trip so enjoyable, and I would also like to thank Mrs. Grierson, Mrs. Noad, Mrs. Shilton, Mr. Gilchrist, and Mr. Ringrose for giving up their time to accompany us. Vive la France (les escargots aussi!) et à la prochaine. Merci à tous.


