Year 7 Transition: Building the Kingdom of God

On Thursday 16th October, we celebrated our Year 7 Mass of Welcome. This Mass marks the end of our Year 7 pupils' transition, where we formally welcome them into the All Hallows community. It was wonderful to be joined by so many of the Year 7s' friends and family for this special celebration. The Mass was concelebrated by Fr Michael, Fr Ian and Deacon Bill from our partner parishes, and it was a delight to have them all with us. They play a huge part in the Catholic life of our school, and we thank them for all the time they give to us. The theme of the Mass was 'Building the Kingdom'. This year, Pope Leo has invited all young people to reflect on how we can build the Kingdom of God on earth. Our Year 7 pupils have already reflected on this theme during their retreat days at Lowe House in St Helens, and they have since thought of ways in which this theme helps them to belong to our All Hallows community. During the Mass, the readings reflected on how we can build the Kingdom of God on earth. The Gospel reading was from Mark and explained the Parable of the Mustard Seed, showing how we can grow individually but also as a Catholic community. It reminded us that we all have hidden potential, along with unique gifts and talents — even the smallest of seeds can grow into the biggest tree.

The Mass was a true celebration of what it means to be part of the All Hallows community. This was symbolised by the procession of form groups into the Mass, where each pupil placed a 'Building the Kingdom' challenge card in their form box, which was offered as a prayer and placed in front of the altar. Pupils had written on these cards one thing that they could do to build the Kingdom of God on earth.

It was wonderful to come together as a Year 7 community to celebrate this Mass, united in faith, raising the roof with our brilliant pupil choir through songs of praise, while also reflecting silently in the presence of God with our own needs and intentions. The special offertory was particularly poignant, with pupils bringing up symbols relating to their first few weeks at All Hallows and looking ahead to their next five years in the school.

All of the Year 7 pupils had a role in the Mass — from altar serving to taking part in the procession, to reading and bringing up the gifts. Perhaps the highlight of the Mass came in the post-Communion reflection, where all of the pupils took part in 'Sign Your Cross', a Sign of the Cross mime set to music. It was a truly beautiful way to mark the importance of prayer and reflection.

We thank everyone who helped put this Mass together and all who made it such a joy-filled celebration.






Our Year 7 students have been getting hands-on with chemistry in STEM Club over the past few weeks with Miss Shirley. In their first session, pupils explored the pH scale and experimented with universal indicator to see how different solutions change colour, creating a dazzling "rainbow fizz." The following week, they became real scientists by making their own natural pH indicator from red cabbage. Using their homemade indicator, they tested a range of everyday household liquids and compared the colours with those from the universal indicator. Everyone enjoyed discovering the science behind acids and alkalis and seeing chemistry come to life through colour!

STEM club at All Hallows is a great place to learn more about engineering and also you will have lots of fun at the same time. We have competitions every year in different schools and then when we host a competition we invite lots of other schools into our school. At STEM we build robots and it is so fun to have a part in stem club and compete and represent our school.

A group of enthusiastic Year 7 students have been getting hands-on with physics and engineering, using their Maths skills, in the weekly STEM club — by building Pringle rings!

Using nothing more than standard curved Pringles crisps and a lot of patience, the students were challenged to create freestanding circular rings, which demonstrates principles of tension, gravity, and structural engineering. The task required them to work together, experiment with angles, and carefully balance each crisp in a spiraling pattern.

The project wasn't just fun — it also helped the students learn about the forces at play in real-world engineering, including compression and friction. As they worked to complete their rings, the young engineers had to problem-solve in real time, adjusting their designs and learning from collapsed attempts.

Mrs Walsh said: "It's amazing to see how much teamwork, resilience, and critical thinking goes into something as simple as stacking crisps. It's a great way to introduce students to engineering concepts in a fun and memorable way."

The session ended with successful rings built by the teams and maybe even a few snack-related celebrations too!

After half term the club will be moving on toother exciting hands-on challenges, but the Pringle ring project is sure to be a highlight the students won't forget.
