

Advent: Hope



Word of the Week Matthew 24:37-44

Jesus said to his disciples: 'As it was in Noah's day, so will it be when the Son of Man comes. For in those days before the Flood people were eating, drinking, taking wives, taking husbands, right up to the day Noah went into the ark, and they suspected nothing till the Flood came and swept all away. It will be like this when the Son of Man comes. Then of two men in the fields one is taken, one left; of two women at the millstone grinding, one is taken, one left.

'So stay awake, because you do not know the day when your master is coming. You may be quite sure of this, that if the householder had known at what time of the night the burglar would come, he would have stayed awake and would not have allowed anyone to break through the wall of his house. Therefore, you too must stand ready because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.'

For lots of people, the four weeks of Advent are just a countdown of shopping days to Christmas.

For Christians, Advent is a special holy time heading up to the birth of their saviour Jesus Christ. The word Advent means 'coming'. When someone special is coming to visit it is usual to prepare and get ready. The Gospel reading this week reminds us to be ready. It serves as a reminder to remain vigilant as we never know when the time may come.

During Advent Christians prepare themselves for the coming of the infant Jesus. The Church sees Advent as the beginning of the religious year. It is a time to look back over the past year and to ask for Gods forgiveness for all the times we have said or done something wrong. Let us prepare our hearts and minds to welcome the infant Jesus.

Challenges for the week ahead:

Live with awareness: Don't get lost in routine or distractions; cultivate spiritual attentiveness. Take a break from social media.

Practice readiness: Readiness means living with integrity, compassion and faith.

Encourage others: Share hope for the future. Help others when they need it.

Merciful Father,


